

In 1847, the Coeur d'Alene Indians and Jesuit missionaries, led by Father Jean DeSmet, built the Mission of the Sacred Heart on a grassy hill above the South Fork of the Coeur d'Alene River. The Coeur d'Alenes make an annual pilgrimage to the Cataldo Mission every August. This impressive hand-built structure is held together by wooden pegs, straw and river mud. It is the oldest building still standing in Idaho.

The Plummer-Worley School District is a small rural public school system located within the boundaries of the Coeur d'Alene Indian Reservation. Our students are educated in a diverse, supportive, and progressive environment. Student enrollment is 74 percent Native American, 24 percent Caucasian, and 2 percent other. 9 percent of our students are of Hispanic descent.



The district comprises the communities of Plummer, Worley, Tensed, and DeSmet. All schools are located on one campus in Plummer. Plummer is 35 miles south of Coeur d'Alene and 50 miles north of Moscow. Spokane, Washington is a short 45-minute drive.

Outdoor enthusiasts will love the wide variety of activities available. With a short six mile drive you can find Heyburn State Park which is located along the southern shore of Lake Coeur d'Alene and boasts boating, swimming, fishing, camping, hiking, wildlife viewing, and an Interpretive Site.



Pictured above is a section from the "Trail of the Coeur d'Alenes", a 72 mile scenic, paved bike trail starting in Plummer and ending in Mullan. From this trail, you can witness everything from breathtaking views of the mountains, the St. Joe River, and Lake Coeur d'Alene to all forms of native wildlife, including small and large animals.

Joe River where you can fish or raft (with a choice of rapids or a leisurely float), camp, hunt, or hike. You can also leave the river and visit one of the many streams for first class creek fishing. Wildlife is abundant and includes elk, deer, bear, moose, cougar, waterfowl, upland game birds, wild turkey, and more.



Winter activities include downhill or cross country skiing with several resorts to choose from. Also available are miles of groomed snowmobile trails. If you prefer the unbeaten path, your choices are unlimited. One might consider riding from Idaho into Montana.
